Sustainability Curriculum Goes Solar With Foundation Grant

Kathy Stanley's 2nd/3rd grade class at South Whidbey Elementary is learning science, art and literacy skills through the study of "Sustainability."

From the benefits of reducing waste and recycling to using alternative energy sources, the students are putting these concepts into practice and learning about responsible environmental stewardship.


According to Ms. Stanley, "Sustainability is now a required part of K-12 curriculum with it's own learning outcomes."

One highlight of the integrated studies program was made possible by a \$450 grant from the South Whidbey Schools Foundation, which provides needed financial support for teacher-requested projects and innovative learning activities to benefit South Whidbey students. Some of the funds managed by the Foundation, including those awarded to Ms. Stanley, were provided by Puget Sound Energy.

Ms. Stanley's class used the Foundation grant to purchase a solar oven. The apparatus uses reflective aluminum panels to concentrate the sun's rays to heat a compartment for cooking without the

need for electricity or gas.

As Ms. Stanley's class learned, similar ovens are often used in disaster relief efforts and in impoverished areas of the world where fuel for heating is either scarce or dangerous to use.



Despite the less than ideal conditions, the students deployed their energy-saving device on an overcast day in February to cook a batch of gluten-free brownies. The mid-winter sun provided just enough

energy to heat the oven to 300 degrees F, 50 degrees short of that recommended by the recipe. Undaunted, the students merely adjusted the cooking time - from one to four hours - and before the end of the day the brownies were cooked and ready to enjoy. According to at least one student, "They were sooooo good!"

The students maintained journals, in which they wrote about other aspects of the program, including documenting the process of garbage rotting over time to learn what waste items are good candidates for garden composting.

The class also wrote letters thanking the Foundation for the grant and invited board members to share in treats from the solar oven.

Hands-On Rain Garden Project Ends Flooding at LMS

With the help of a grant from the South Whidbey Schools Foundation, Langley Middle School science teacher Jay Freundlich and his sixth grade science students solved a very wet problem for their school by constructing a new rain garden between the Library building and the Science building.

The rain garden includes a series of berms, a catch basin, natural mulch material and appropriate plantings to both absorb and redirect the water so that it no longer threatens the lower classroom.

The project allowed the students to get real world experience in solving a civil engineering problem using sustainable environmental principles. They helped design the rain garden and did much of the work themselves.

“Before this project, when it rained hard, sheets of water would wash over this area down to an inadequate drain, and then eventually flood our classroom,” said Freundlich.

“The students not only got to put their classroom learning about the environment to work, but they also helped make their school environment better and safer. This is Project Based Learning at its best,” he added.

The area where the rain garden was constructed originally had grass with



about an inch of topsoil, which, over time became hardpan and prevented the underlying sandy soils from absorbing rainwater.

“We removed the hard pan layer, introduced new plantings, lots of mulch, and re-graded the area to carry excess water to a basin where it can be slowly absorbed.” said Freundlich.

The rain garden project had been planned by the School District for a couple of years, but due to budget constraints it was not moving forward until a \$1,000 grant from the Foundation, and additional funding from Learn and Serve America,

“This project exemplifies the kind of innovative, high impact educational

enhancement that the Foundation facilitates with the money we raise,” said John Knox, Foundation Board President.

Red Apple's 'Cash Back for Kids' Program Helps Students and the Environment






\$13,000 Raised for Classroom Grants at May Gala Dinner Fundraiser

During the 2010/11 school year the South Whidbey Schools Foundation provided 20 classroom grants covering projects ranging from reading proficiency to spectral analysis to learning about sustainable gardening.

Reports on the impact of several of these grants were made at the May fundraising Gala, which in turn raised over \$13,000 to help fund 2011/12 grants.

The SWSF Board worked hard to organize the annual May Gala Dinner at Useless Bay Golf and Country Club. Last May's dinner raised over \$13,000 to be used for grants in the 2011-2012 school year through an after-dinner auction.

Mentorship Award

Nels Bergquist English Teacher at SWHS in 2010/11; now at LMS

Nels Bergquist, selected as 2010-2011 Mentor Teacher by South Whidbey High School seniors, is a fourth generation Whidbey Islander, who became a teacher to "...give back to the community that is my home."

For the past eight years, Bergquist has taught in many disciplines and levels ranging from fourth and fifth grade mathematics to LMS social studies, English, PE and Health, to SWHS Creative Writing and Public Speaking.

"I have, in particular, enjoyed working with the staff and students of Langley Middle School. The high level of creativity



of the middle level teachers spurred my desire to innovate. Greg Willis, the long-time principal at LMS, was a leader that I looked up to during my early years with the district.

"My fondest memories involve the five years I taught Adventure Education at LMS, which included over fifteen backpacking trips to California and the Washington Coast," he said.

One of the student nominations stated that Mr. Bergquist had "changed my life," and "helped me find my inner voice." Others mentioned that he is generally, "awesome."

Extra-Mile Award

Valerie Brown, Teacher at SWES

Val Brown, SWSF's 2010/11 Extra-Mile Award recipient, has taught kindergarten and served as a library media specialist for the past 18 years. Fellow staff members describe Brown's work in the library as exceptional because she "...makes the Elementary Library a welcoming place for all students, going far beyond her contractual hours to make sure the library is opened during rainy day and lunch time recesses."

Brown has enjoyed working with a very supportive staff. She reports that any time she says, "I have this idea...", people are always willing to jump in and help me make it work. They make me look good."

Some highlights mentioned by others include *I-Did-A-Read*, during which each class worked collaboratively to create a dog that moved along an *Iditarod*



map showing how many hours that class read. "It was wonderful to be in the hallway when students arrived in the morning and see them get excited about books and have meaningful conversations about them," she said.

Brown also seeks ways to include world events in the students' reading. For example, after the devastating Japanese earthquake, she shared the book, *Sadako and the Thousand Cranes* with students, and spearheaded the entire school to make 1000 cranes, now hanging in the library. With the awareness of childhood hunger, she used a book called *What The World Eats* as a springboard to awareness of families suffering from hunger in other countries.

Brown continues to celebrate literacy by supporting and encouraging the broad SWES community of children, parents, and staff. Due to budget cuts, however, she is now the Title Reading teacher at SWES where she continues to promote literacy with students, staff, and parents.
