“Students explored current alternative energy sources and engineering principles as they designed and constructed solar boats and solar cars. They produced projects that demonstrated their understanding of the technology and its applications.

I used the solar equipment I purchased with the grant in my Inventions class, and this spring I am incorporating the material into the regular 8th grade curriculum.

The grant dollars always enhance the opportunities my students have to experience more advanced and current technology. Most of the materials are reusable and will be a part of the curriculum for years to come.

Aquaponics

“I did some online research and took a course on aquaponics. I got excited that it could be a great way to integrate science learning in the classroom and offer students hands-on learning and collaborative learning and extending it to global issues as well.

Aquaponics combines both plants and fish in a recirculating environment – growing them together. It offers a direct tie-in to science concepts such as water, nitrogen cycles, plant biology, fish anatomy, chemistry, ecosystems, engineering, and math as well.

Having this model system in the classroom is great because when I teach a concept, students are able to go and look at it and make the connections themselves.

They really enjoy hands-on learning and working together to learn through this system.”

Dear Foundation Supporters:

Last year was exceptionally good for innovative learning in the South Whidbey School District. Thanks to supporters like you, the Foundation provided more than \$25,000 to fund 22 innovative teaching projects – a \$3,000 increase over the previous school year. Thank you!

Newly funded projects in the 2014-15 school year included robotics for 6th graders, aquaponics, establishing a teacher's professional development group at the high school, and a 7th grade oceanography program. Projects receiving continuing support included underwater robotics, professional music clinician tutors, and school garden-related projects.

This fall the Foundation received 31 grant applications seeking over \$40,000 for the 2015-16 school year – the most ever requested. With \$25,000 to distribute, we had to get creative.

In hopes of funding all worthy projects, we deferred decisions on several in order to raise enough additional funds between now and the time they are needed. For example, two separate but coordinated projects involve use of an oceanographic research vessel for several days next spring. The applicants have raised some money through other means, but still need \$3,000 from the Foundation.

That's why your response to this end-of-year appeal is especially important!

Our all-volunteer Board works hard to provide you with a variety of ways to fund classroom grants, including:

- becoming a sponsor in our new **"Adopt-a-Grant"** program which allows you to follow your educational passions by funding a specific project or area.

I hope you find this annual report informative. I hope it inspires you to renew your support in providing funding for teacher-requested classroom projects to enhance the education our children deserve.

SWSF funded 23 classroom projects with \$25,044 in school year 2014/2015

The Foundation awarded 23 grants totaling \$25,044 for classroom projects, materials, equipment and off-site trip fees in school year 2014/15.

Funded projects integrated several subject areas and included a garden learning project, a kindergarten cooking project, and salmon-in-the-classroom science and art projects in the elementary school; robotics and oceanography programs at the middle school; music, art and STEM programs at South Whidbey Academy; and a professional development program at the high school.

Several projects received continuing Foundation support, such as a program to bring in professional musicians to work with the middle school orchestra and jazz band, sponsoring field trips to South Whidbey State Park, and helping to fund the School District's Garden Program.

Note: Teachers submit best case estimates of project costs. The total grant amount awarded for 2014/15 was \$26,100. Actual costs were less in several cases last year, resulting in a \$1,056 return of funds by the District to be used for future grants.

Financial Recap for 2014/2015

In fiscal year 2014/15, the South Whidbey Schools Foundation received donations totaling \$25,021, and coupled with fund-raising efforts (\$21,593) and interest (\$15) our revenues totaled \$46,629.

The Foundation awarded \$25,044 in grants in 2014/15 for 23 classroom projects.





Heartfelt presentations were made by principals at South Whidbey Academy (David Pfeiffer), South Whidbey Elementary (Jeff Cravy) and Langley Middle School (Eric Nerison) on the impact that Foundation-funded projects had on their schools. SWHS English teacher Jennifer Gandarias spoke about the benefits of a Foundation-funded professional development program which she spearheaded.

A SWHS jazz combo and the Music in Motion SWHS Choir under the direction of Paula Ludtke, provided entertainment at the Dinner Gala.

Various demonstrations and displays of Foundation-funded projects were held by the SWA Underwater Robotics Team, SWSD Farm and Garden coordinator Cary Peterson, and SWES teacher Bruce Callahan, and we thank them for their involvement.

Emcee Jim Freeman auctioned off donated items with his usual witty repartee and charm, and helped Schools Superintendent Jo Moccia conduct the "Medallion Game," which involves eliminating medallion holders until the last one standing wins half the proceeds from the medallion sales.

Special thanks to Shelly Ackerman, who won the Medallion Game for the second year in a row and promptly donated her entire \$1,000 winnings back to the Foundation (again)!

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Davies and Felgar receive the Foundation's teacher recognition awards for 2014/15

Charlie Davies was honored with the Foundation's **Extra-Mile Award** which goes to a District teacher for going the proverbial "extra-mile" in terms of service to students and faculty.

Davies, a District alum, is the special education and work-based learning teacher at South Whidbey High School. Davies' nomination was endorsed by more than 25 district faculty and staff.

As one of Davies' colleagues explained: "I have seen Charlie be a teacher first, but also a mentor, adviser, coach, trainer, disciplinarian, and someone whom the students look up to and strive to be like. He can take a bad situation and turn it into a great positive learning lesson for the students. He amazes us every day... He gives everyone around him the feeling of wanting to do their best."

"He goes above and beyond to make sure he has given our students every opportunity to succeed," wrote another.

The Foundation's annual **Mentorship Award** recognizes teachers, principals and other school-based staff who exemplify the kind of commitment to students

that creates exceptional results. Graduating seniors nominate a teacher who has had a lasting positive impact on their lives.

This year's recipient was Chad Felgar, also a South Whidbey alum, and former high school shop and agriculture teacher.

In nominating Felgar, graduating seniors wrote: "He always keeps students busy with new,

fun projects," wrote one senior.

"Mr. Felgar has influenced me to be the best I could possibly be. He has given me the confidence to be who I am," wrote another student.


"(Mr.) Felgar showed me what it is like to have a job, good work ethic and to be a leader," commented another student.
