Grants provide hands-on learning opportunities for SW students

The above maxim describes a common theme integral to most of the grants made by the South Whidbey Schools Foundation for school year 2021/22.

High school students in Don Wills' Shop Foundations class (right) designed and constructed an 8' x 12' garden shed, which when auctioned online, brought in \$6,150 to pay for this year's project materials.

Leonard Good taught fifth-graders the ways that energy is generated, stored and released. They later constructed and flew balsa wood planes to demonstrate kinetic energy and energy transfer, as well as the mechanics of lift and thrust.

At the South Whidbey Community Center, Alternate Learning Experience (A.L.E.) students restored salmon habitat by clearing large areas of brush and planting back with small native shrubs.

They also created a 'pocket park' in the







Center's courtyard area by decorating and installing food waste composting receptacles, planting a flower garden at the front of the auditorium, and constructing a wooden cover for the generator.

Third and fifth grade students observed salmon eggs transform first into fry and then into fingerlings in their school

aquarium before releasing them into Maxwelton Creek.

At the South Whidbey Middle/High School farm, students constructed a hoop house thanks to a grant from the Foundation.

Middle and High School Farm Hoop House Produces Hands-On Learning



►A caterpillar tunnel hoop house was put together by South Whidbey High School and Middle School students in the Agriculture program thanks to a grant from the Schools Foundation. The produce was used by the school cafeteria, and surplus was for sale to the public at the vegetable stand operated by the students in front of the high school. The stand was also a project funded by the Foundation the previous year.



A.L.E. Students Design and Build a Pocket Park plus Restore Salmon Habitat



► Alternative Learning Experience (A.L.E.) students designed and worked hard to create a pocket park at the South Whidbey Community Center.

They also helped to restore salmon habitat by clearing brush by the creek in the back of the property.

Additionally, the students created and decorated food composting receptacles in the courtyard area, and planted native plants in front of the auditorium.



Elementary School Forest Playground Refurbishment



► Last spring, SWES received a Foundation grant to update their forest playground to create an outdoor space that was developmentally appropriate for kindergarten and first grade students.

This has become a joyful outdoor classroom; part of SWES Farm, Forest and Sea learning goals.

Salmon In the Classroom Project Teaches About Our Puget Sound Habitat

► The annual salmon release is always a favorite. South Whidbey third- and fifth-graders raised salmon from eggs to fingerlings in the school aquarium, and then released them into Maxwelton Creek at the Rene

Neff Outdoor Classroom. Students learned all about the life-cycle of salmon as well as how pollution, climate change, and other stressors can affect their survival.

K-6 Food Forest Project

► The South Whidbey School Farm and the First Grade class teachers worked with first grade students to design and grow a Food Forest.

In this forest students experienced the Forest in a new way-- as a food source. They planted trees, shrubs and understory plants for a future of harvesting nuts and fruits. This method augments the curriculum already in place on the school farm. Currently crops are grown in an annual-based system where the food plant is planted once a year and then removed during or after the harvest.

In a food forest, the plants remain after the harvest and the relationships between the plants becomes a significant feature of the system. This project gives children the opportunity to participate in both types of systems.





Middle School Art Enrichment Supplies

► When our on-campus classes resumed after the pandemic, Middle School teacher Susan Milan applied for a grant for supplies for 60 students enrolled in an art enrichment class.

She saw many benefits from students able to express

themselves through art after a time of great challenge.

Financial Recap for 2021/22 School Year

In fiscal year 2021/22, South Whidbey Schools Foundation received donations totaling \$58,943, including \$13,043 from our online gala. Our general fund revenues totaled \$60,287.

In the school year 2021/22 the South Whidbey Schools Foundation disbursed \$54,920 in grants, including \$17,000 in school principals' discretionary funds.

I would like to tell you about one of these donations in the form of a \$20,000 legacy gift made by Gene White. I have fond memories of Gene. She was a remarkable woman who rose from a school food services director to become a global leader in school nutrition.

Gene advised countries around the globe and worked with U.S. AID and the United Nations to improve students' health through school meal programs. She co-founded the Global Child Nutrition Foundation which hosts an annual world forum on school food programs attended



by representatives of 650 countries. Its annual lifetime achievement award is named after Gene.

Locally, Gene served for many years on the Good Cheer Food Bank Board. She cared deeply about schools and quality nutrition for children. We have begun distributing funds this year, ensuring her bequest is utilized in the best way possible to honor her passion via this very generous gift.

Legacy gifts enable us to expand our vision of enhancing education for students in our community public schools. They are a great way to make a final statement of what mattered to you in life.
